**Notables**

- Over 6,100 jobs providing essential government services were saved through the use of Recovery Act Stabilization funds. These jobs include police officers, firefighters and teachers.
- 3,972 Wisconsin youth received valuable summer work experience.
- 175 Americorp members have provided over 31,000 hours of services at 139 locations.
- 23 projects have been funded to provide homelessness prevention assistance and services and re-housing and stabilization services. To date 476 persons in 227 families have received assistance.
- 240 homes are having lead paint removed.
- 89,507 meals were provided to 9,175 homebound seniors.
- 62 people are enrolled in senior employment programs receiving work experience and training in unsubsidized employment.

### ARRA 1512 FACTS

- 1512 is a section of the Recovery Act that requires certain data to be given to the federal government on a periodic basis (every three months after October 2009).
- The 1512 process includes 99 different data elements. The number of data elements reported per program depends on which fields are applicable, and how many sub-awards and vendors are involved. That means there could be thousands of data elements for one program, or as few as 60.
- The types of data required to be reported to the federal government include:
  - Amount of money spent as of a certain time
  - Name of contractor hired (if applicable)
  - Location of work
  - Project status
  - Quarterly activity description
  - Award description
  - Recipient's location
- The 1512 process requires a specific calculation about job impact for each pot of money (there are over 350 pots of money). The calculation involves an average of full-time equivalent positions over the period of the grant. The job calculation will NOT reflect number of people hired for each program. The calculation varies between federal agencies and the rules could change in coming weeks.
- The job number estimate contained in the job description field is an estimate of not only the direct jobs but also indirect and induced jobs created or retained. This number is calculated by using a formula development by the White House Council of Economic Advisers and is based on actual expenditures to date.
- The data given to the federal government will be posted on [www.Recovery.gov](http://www.Recovery.gov) in October. Originally the data was to have been posted on Oct. 10 but has been delayed until Oct. 30.
- The data given to the federal government by Wisconsin will be posted on [www.recovery.wi.gov](http://www.recovery.wi.gov) on October 13. This data will be updated as new information becomes available. Information on Recovery Act funds awarded to non-state agency entities will be provided and updated as it becomes available from the federal government.
- The 1512 process is separate from existing reporting requirements for each program. That means there are three levels of information gathering for Recovery Act dollars. The federal agencies report to OMB on their spending. The state reports to OMB on state agency spending. A wide variety of ARRA recipients report to the federal government to comply with 1512 requirements.
- The data will not be exhaustive. It will include ONLY what is required in the Recovery Act, as interpreted by OMB and federal agencies.
- The state of Wisconsin has chosen to conduct a centralized reporting approach to minimize duplication of data and non-compliance with the federal requirements. All

state agencies with the exception of the UW System are participating in the centralized approach.

- Approximately a dozen state employees have been processing data sent by state agencies prior to the October 10 deadline.
- The Governor's Office of Recovery and Reinvestment will take its own data from state agencies receiving Recovery Act dollars and compile reports and maps that show how the money is being spent. This will include a more direct explanation of job creation and retention.

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
